Dr. Lynn Caldwell has been on faculty with St. Andrew's College since 2009, and in the fulltime position of Professor of Church and Society since 2015. She graduated from St. Andrew's College with an MDiv in 1995, which served as preparation for further study and work in anti-racist and anti-oppressive education including graduate studies and teaching in Sociology and Equity Studies in Education. A strong theme in her scholarship and teaching is attention to all kinds of differences – moral, theological, social, and personal – and to forms of learning and care that turn toward justice.
